



Career and Education Celebrates a Successful Summer for Students

Career and Education had a busy summer! We ran 4 consecutive summer programs for our Elementary, Middle School and High School Students.

The Elementary Summer Adventure was designed with a focus on merging academic and cultural topics to support K-5 students. This year's program had a focus on cultural awareness and supported 60 students in grades Kindergarten through 5th grade. Each day consisted of a learning activity with a focus on academic skills such as spelling, sight words, or basic math skills followed by a culturally rel-

evant story (Jingle Dancer, Fry Bread, 13 Moons on a Turtles Back, Stolen Words, Bow Wow Pow Wow), mid morning recess, snack, cultural craft and recess/dismissal. The last day of the session included a carnival for the students where they were able to enjoy skill-based games, bounce house, water slide, face painting, snacks and lunch.

The Middle School Summer Adventure was designed with a focus on merging academic and cultural topics to support 6th-8th grade students. This year's program had a focus on STEM and cultural awareness while supporting 16 students. Each day consisted of a learning activity

with a focus on academic skills such as writing paragraphs or basic math skills followed by a culturally relevant hands on activity, snack and recess/dismissal. The session culminated in a reward event that included taking the group to a Seattle Mariner's game where students learned about the distance between bases, calculating batting averages, and utilizing money math to determine the cost of souvenirs when calculating tax. They also had the opportunity to watch the game itself as well as meet some of the players in person for autographs. For many of the participants it was their first experience at a major league game.

The High School program provided credit retrieval services to grades 9-12. We had 19 students who retrieved credits in the core subjects of Math, Science, English and History. We also had students who retrieved elective credits in Art. We will continue to provide this service to our students who are in need of credit retrieval.

Hatchery Construction Update!

Construction on the new Hatchery, boat ramp, community shelter has begun! The projects kicked off with the demolition of the 40+ year-old hatchery and concrete filtration system. Soon after, 25-foot concrete pilings were installed to support the foundation of the new two-story Hatchery building.

While these projects will offer many long-term benefits to the community, there are some short-term inconveniences. While active construction is underway:

- The trail from the cemetery to Point Julia is closed.
- Access to the beach is limited, but the beach remains open for use. Please do not walk through the construction site or climb over the silt fencing.
- A portion of the south side of Point Julia is closed near the south boat ramp.
- Only the north boat ramp will be accessible for launching boats.
- A portion of the parking area next to the boat ramp will be used by construction crews. While this may limit parking, this area will still be accessible by the community.

Throughout the construction, there may be additional closures or delays accessing Point Julia or limitation to use of the existing shelter. These will be minimized as much as possible.

The boat ramp is five years in the making. Construction is expected to be completed in December.

The new hatchery building will include 1800 square feet over two stories and will feature a Coast Salish design. The ground floor will house hatchery operations with staff offices and a conference room on the second level. A concrete piling foundation will be able to withstand rising waters. A number of other sustainable features are also being implemented to ensure longevity.

The new 1,500 square foot community-use shelter will include a prep table and an extended seating/picnic area. The shelter will also include a storage area to house additional chairs and tables for community events. Native and culturally significant plants will replace the non-native along the shoreline between the hatchery and the new shelter. The new hatchery building and community shelter are both slated to be ready by early 2023.



Clark Construction Wins Contract for Warrior Ridge Project; Begins Work on Phase One

The Port Gamble S'Klallam (PGST) Housing Authority has awarded Clark Construction the contract for the Tribe's Warrior Ridge housing complex project. Clark Construction is headquartered on Bainbridge Island.

Clark Construction's team began on-site work in mid-July. Warrior Ridge is located across the Little Boston Rd. from Gliding Eagle Marketplace on the PGST reservation. Initial infrastructure work and site prep began in 2021.

Clark's contract is for Phase One of the Warrior Ridge project. This includes 30 mixed units with duplexes and single-family homes, all for the exclusive use of Tribal members and their families. Fifteen units are earmarked for Elders and seven homes are reserved for low-income families.

Also included is transitional housing for homeless or other low-income individuals struggling to meet housing needs. "There is a constant need for more housing on the reservation, especially for our lower income families who are particularly vulnerable in the current rental market. Warrior Ridge begins to address this problem," said Kara Wright, Director, PGST Housing Authority.

Warrior Ridge will employ an on-site case manager to help residents access other Tribal services.

Phase One units are expected to be ready for move in by late 2023. Planning for additional phases is under way and are expected to include additional housing and community recreation.



Community Comes Out for Hazardous Waste Drive

On July 23rd, the Port Gamble S'Klallam Tribe hosted its first Household Hazardous Waste Drive. Funded through an EPA grant, the event provided an opportunity for PGST community members to drop off hazardous waste items for proper disposal.

Throughout the day, 32 cars brought by items that included used needles, expired medications, ammunition, marine flares, batteries, expired gasoline, used motor oil, and various household chemicals. Each participant received a Jiffy Lube gift card to further help keep hazardous waste off of the Reservation.

Josh Carter, an environmental scientist in PGST's Natural Resources department, organized the event and thanked everyone who participated. Carter stressed that every item collected is one fewer that can cause negative impacts to the PGST community.

"As implied by their name, hazardous waste items are potential health and environmental hazards," said Carter. "Some are carcinogenic and might cause cancers or trigger existing issues like asthma, COPD, skin conditions, or allergies. They are also potentially dangerous to the environment, as they don't break down easily and may persist in the soil for years, increasing the likelihood that people or

animals will come into contact with them. A major risk is contamination of the Tribe's shores where shellfish may consume these substances, resulting in illness in Tribal members who consume shellfish as well as possible beach closures." The Tribe's partner for the event was Clean Harbors, a company that specializes in the proper disposal of hazardous waste.

Carter is planning another Household Hazardous Waste Drive for September and is hoping to increase the number of households on the reservation that participate. The date for the Drive will be announced as soon as it's available, but, for now, Carter encourages PGST community members to look around their homes for concerning items. When it comes to chemicals, it's best to assume they're hazardous, regardless of whether the label uses terms like "natural" or "organic."

Households who need to dispose of dangerous waste items before or after the September drive can do so at the Household Hazardous Waste Facility in Bremerton. In addition, the Hansville Transfer Station accepts, at no charge, used motor oil and antifreeze; batteries, compact fluorescent lamps and tubes; and used needles/syringes. The PGST Health Center also accepted used needles and there is an electronics waste disposal bin near the wet lab.



PGST Celebrates 100th Employee with 10 Years Tenure

In early August, the Port Gamble S'Klallam Tribe passed a significant milestone: the 100th Government employee with a tenure of at least 10 years!

Currently, PGST Government operations employ 313 staff. This includes everyone who works in administration and the Tribe's various departments.

When hiring new employees, PGST employs a Tribal Preference policy that gives preference in all aspects of employment to enrolled PGST members, followed by PGST descendants and parents of enrolled member children, and then members of other tribes. The Tribal Preference policy allows the Tribe to provide opportunities for upward mobility to its membership,

while ensuring that staff is well qualified and understands the uniqueness of the PGST community.

Over the last several years, the Tribal Preference policy has paid off in placing tribal members in these staffing roles: today, 63% of PGST Government staff are tribal, with 43% enrolled PGST members! This is a significant shift from just 10 years ago when just over half of staff was identified as tribal!

Reason for requesting the naming: These two new houses are specifically for those individuals who have criminal justice involvement and/or substance use disorders and who are at the greatest risk of reoffending and/or relapse with nowhere to turn because of the lack of clean and sober housing, often having burned bridges with family, friends, and community due to significant criminal justice involvement and addiction. These houses will provide the opportunity to return to community healthy and whole. We are planning to have the houses open by the end of the summer!

Civil Legal Aid Clinics Planned for August

There are two open civil legal aid clinics planned for August. During these clinics, our civil legal aid can help with issues related to family, law, probate, wills, trusts, and any other civil legal matter.

The dates for the clinics are August 11 from 9 am to 11:30 am, and on August 25 from 1 pm to 3:30 pm. Both events will be held in the Community Court room.

The open clinics will be held by Paul Cullen, who is providing Civil Legal Aid services to the PGST community. Cullen has over 35 years of legal experience. He

has been recognized often, including being named “Best on Bainbridge” for his work as an attorney.

While Cullen’s offices are on Bainbridge Island, he will be on-site twice a month for open clinics. If you need legal assistance on any civil (not criminal) legal issue, please call the Court Clerk’s office at 360-297-9682 to schedule an appointment.

COVID UPDATE: Information on Rising Case Numbers

COVID cases have started to trend upward in Kitsap County and throughout Washington state. This most recent uptick in infections is being caused by the BA.5 variant of Omicron, an extremely virulent form of COVID.

Anyone experiencing any cold or flu-like symptoms is encouraged to test for COVID. Testing is available at the PGST Community Health Center Monday through Friday from 9 am to 3 pm. At-home testing kits are also available for free to PGST community members and staff. Those testing positive with an at-home kit are encouraged to report their case to the Health Center. Knowing the number of positive cases helps the Tribe make informed decisions about the ongoing pandemic to best protect the community.

The PGST Community Health Center can provide the latest quarantine and isolation guidelines and as well as doses of Paxlovid, an oral medication that has been proven to minimize the worst effects of COVID in all patients. In clinical trials, unvaccinated individuals who were given Paxlovid were 89% less likely to develop severe illness or die from complications related to COVID. Paxlovid can also minimize severe illness in the vaccinated. If you’re ill with COVID, contact the Health

Center for Paxlovid. A brief screening is required.

Unlike during last summer’s surge powered by the Delta variant, vaccines are now readily available for all age groups. The PGST Community Health Center has vaccines and boosters available immediately for all adults aged 18 and over. A first booster can be administered at least five months after the second dose of the initial vaccine. A second booster is available four months after the first.

In late July, the Health Center’s stock of vaccines for kids aged 5-11 was depleted, but additional shipments are expected in August. Call the clinic for current availability.

Pediatric vaccine doses for aged 6 months to 5 years are available immediately.

To schedule an appointment for a vaccine, call 360-297-2840. For testing, to report a positive case, receive the latest isolation guidelines, request Paxlovid, or for any inquiry related to COVID, please contact the PGST Community Health Center COVID line at 360-297-9674.



Cultural Events Take Center Stage at Heronswood

Heronswood and Cultural Resources have partnered to bring classes and other programming for Tribal community members and staff to the Garden. Heronswood is the only botanical garden in the U.S. owned by a Native American tribe.

In August, there are two opportunities to learn a new, culturally connected skill at Heronswood:

- **Medicine Bag Beading:** One two-day class on August 13 & 14 from 9 am to 3 pm. Taught by Roxanne Hockett. Learn how to bead embroidery on leather. All materials are provided. Not available for this class? Hockett will lead another two-day beading class on September 17 & 18 from 9 am to 3 pm.
- **Cedar Paper Making:** Two classes, one each on August 27 & 28 from 9:30 am to 3:30 pm. Taught by Kara Horton. This class will take students through the steps to prepare cedar “scraps” to make paper. Participants will be able to make their own paper and are encouraged to bring materials to mix with the cedar paper such as dried flower petals, leaves, or sweetgrass. Items like clam shells, large rocks, and cereal bowls can be brought to customize shaping. Basic materials to make cedar paper will be provided.

These classes are being offered for free to community members and staff. Classes are limited in size to 10 participants and PGST community members are given priority access. Please bring your own lunch and snacks.

On September 10 and 11, Kara Horton will teach a two-day Cedar Weaving class, instructing students on how to prepare cedar for weaving a medium tray, a heart, and a small basket.

Also on September 10 and 11, Heronswood will hold its Fall Plant Sale, which will feature local nurseries and other vendors as well as an opportunity to tour the garden as it transitions from summer to fall.

While Tribal members are encouraged to visit Heronswood for the Fall Plant Sale, Andrea Dolan-Potter, Executive Director of the Port Gamble S’Klallam Foundation, wants to make sure the PGST community knows they are welcome anytime.

“Heronswood is open to the Tribal community throughout the year, including those days the garden is closed to the general public. We’re also happy to accommodate special requests as we’re able, including for graduation or wedding photos or guided tours,” said Dolan-Potter. “It’s important to us that Tribal members know Heronswood is their garden, a place they can enjoy with their family and friends. This is why we’re working to grow unique opportunities exclusive for the Tribal community.”

In addition to the Cultural classes, the Foundation, which manages Heronswood, wants to welcome PGST vendors to the Garden during events and regular open hours. “All we need is some basic information so we can get them on the calendar. We’ll promote and make scheduling suggestions to reach the greatest number of visitors,” said Dolan-Potter.

There are no fees for Tribal community vendors at Heronswood. Vendors keep all money from sales. Tables, chairs, and other materials are provided.
