The Cultural Resources Department has had a productive and enriching summer, marked by a series of successful initiatives and events that have brought our community closer together and deepened our connection to our heritage.

One of the highlights of our summer was the completion of the third S'Klallam Living Language Program Cohort. Over the last three months, we held 15 language classes, fostering a strong sense of pride and continuity in our linguistic heritage. This program was truly a labor of love, and we would like to extend our heartfelt gratitude to Brooke Wellman, Chris Jones, Karron McGrady, Joe Price, ECEP staff and all our dedicated students who made this program a resounding success. Keep an eye out for our upcoming community gathering and resource sharing event later this month!

In addition to our language program, we successfully facilitated three cedar harvesting events. Twelve families and citizens participated, engaging in harvesting, processing, and teaching

their children about this vital tradition. Cedar is deeply woven into our connection to the land and integral to our cultural practices. This initiative was made possible through the diligent efforts of our Tribal Historic Preservation Officer, Misty Ives, who has maintained a strong relationship with Rayonier. The forest management company, preparing to clear the area soon, invited the tribe to gather resources beforehand, ensuring we could utilize and honor these valuable cedars.

These events underscore our commitment to cultural preservation and community involvement. We look forward to continuing these efforts and invite our community to participate and support our programs. We value your input and ideas. He was generous with his time, his carvings, and his talents, often gifting people his handmade treasures. He loved spending time with family, eating good food, and sharing stories. Anyone who knew him, knew to keep candy on hand, as he had a very strong sweet tooth.

Applications for School Vouchers Now Available

Attention K-12 Families: School clothing vouchers will be available beginning August 1, 2024. Applications will be accepted up until August 30, 2024 at 4:30 pm.

This assistance is for Youth enrolled in grades Kindergarten through 12th grade who meet one of the following criteria:

- Enrolled PGST member
- Direct descendant of an enrolled PGST member in Kitsap County and NOT enrolled with another tribe
- Other/non-tribal youth living permanently on the PGST reservation in a PGST member household

Children who are eligible for assistance from another tribe or agency are not eligible.

Please note that the receipt of the application determines when payment will be issued:

- August 1-6: Payment will be issued on Friday, August 9
- August 7-13: Payment will be issued on Friday, August 16
- August 14-20: Payment will be issued on Friday, August 23

- August 21-27: Payment will be issued on Friday, August 30
- August 28-31: Payment will be issued on Friday, September 6

Applications MUST be turned in by noon on last day of the application period. Any application turned in after noon will be processed for payment the following week.

Assistance amounts depend on the grade the student is entering:

- Kindergarten-3rd grade: \$300
- 4th & 5th grades: \$350
- 6th-8th grade: \$400
- 9th-12th grade: \$450

All applications need to be turned into the Black Box outside the Education building or via email to vouchers@pgst.nsn.us. Do not hand applications to staff.

Housing Celebrates Phase One of Warrior Ridge Neighborhood

On Friday, July 12, Housing held a Grand Opening event for Phase I of Warrior Ridge.

While tenants started moving in late 2023 and the neighborhood is now at 100% occupancy, this was an opportunity to celebrate welcoming PGST families home to the development and look forward to Phase II, which will include an additional 30 units. The event included a tour for investors followed by a block party for tenants and the PGST community with food, games, and music. The event was sponsored by Raymond James, Clark Construction, and Blue Architecture + Interiors.

Phase I of Warrior Ridge included 30 total units, including 15 one-bedroom apartments (595 sq ft), eight one-bedroom duplexes (569 sq ft), and seven two-bedroom cottages (685 sq ft). Units feature wood laminate flooring, energy-efficient appliances, picture windows, and contemporary design features like barn doors separating bedrooms and living spaces. All units are occupied by PGST members who are low-income and pay rent based on their income

Warrior Ridge was funded by several sources, including Affordable Trust Funds, the Affordable Housing Program (a Federal Home Loan Bank through Kitsap Bank), the Indian Community Development Block Grant, and investments from Raymond James, 1st Security Bank, and First Federal Savings & Loan.

Phase II of Warrior Ridge is underway and expected to be move-in ready by Spring 2025.

With 19 canoes full of hungry pullers on their way to Puyallup, we enjoyed a wonderful day welcoming to shore and a night of cultural enrichment. Opportunities and announcements for the S'Klallam Community

Fall General Council: Saturday, October 5

Fall General Council is scheduled for Saturday, October 5. The meeting will begin at 9 am with breakfast at 8 am.

If you would like to submit an agenda request, please get it in by Friday, September 13 at 4:30 pm. Forms can be found from the Front Desk.

All PGST members who are able to attend are encouraged to make time to do so. Meeting a quorum ensures the business of the Tribe, including adoptions, can move forward.

Expanded Enrollment Eligibility: Applications Now Being Accepted

Fall General In June, after a vote by PGST members, Title 25 of the Law & Order Code was amended to reflect new Constitutional language expanding automatic enrollment to individuals who, at the time of their birth, had a parent who was an enrolled PGST member and a resident of the reservation (and other PGST tribal lands) OR Kitsap, Clallam, Jefferson, Mason, or San Juan counties.

While those born after the amendment will be automatically enrolled, those meeting the criteria before the amendment must complete an enrollment application, which can be found at https://pgst.nsn.us/tribal-records-enrollment/.

Those apply for enrollment under the new amendment are encouraged to make sure that their application is complete and that all required supporting paperwork is submitted. This will help to ensure the application is processed as efficiently as possible.

The Point Continues to **Cash PGST Checks**

A recent revision to The Point Casino's check cashing policy pulled back from cashing all third party checks, except

those drawn on any PGST account. Payroll and other checks of totals \$5,000 and under written from Port Gamble S'Klallam government, Noo-Kayet Investments, Gliding Eagle Market, and Noo-Kayet Gaming Corporation accounts will continue to be cashed.

Other third party checks, including those from fisheries or state and federal agencies cannot be cashed at The Point under the new policy.

PORT GAMBLE MILL SITE CLEANUP **AND RESTORATION UPDATE**

Pope Resources announced today that the cleanup and restoration process of the former Pope & Talbot saw mill site and adjacent in-water areas in Port Gamble Bay will be initiated in June 2024 and active construction is expected to be complete by mid-year 2025. The cleanup and restoration activities will include the restoration of the southern part of the mill site's shoreline and the western bay nearshore habitat. These activities will be performed pursuant to two consent decrees dated 2020 and 2024 between Pope Resources, state and federal agencies, and local stakeholders to restore the former mill site. The map shows the location of the five active work zones.
