



How We Are Working to Protect Our Community: A Letter from Chairwoman Amber Caldera



To Our Port Gamble S'Klallam Tribal Members & Community:

In late January, Tribal Council issued a brief statement regarding the response of the PGST government to actions by the current U.S. Administration. I'm coming to you now with more detail, including how we are moving forward.

Within hours of the Inauguration on January 20, 2025, an avalanche of Executive Orders were signed. Every day since the list has grown.

These orders have the potential for catastrophic impacts to Indian Country. For example, the administration is attempting to overturn birthright citizenship—enshrined as the 14th Amendment in the Constitution—and, in doing so, has used language and arguments that could call into question the citizenship of Native Americans across the U.S. As the Office of the President does not have the power to overturn the Constitution, this order has been challenged in Court. As of February 6, 2025, at least two judges—one in Maryland, and another in Washington state—have issued injunctions to block the order.

With that said, our legal teams are watching closely and we're activating our relationships with legislators to help ensure the protection of our sovereignty as an Indigenous nation and rights as U.S. citizens.

While many of the Executive Orders require a diligent “watch and see” approach, other actions have created immediate chaos.

For example, in late January, we received 24 hours' notice of a “temporary pause” on payments of federal grants. Vaguely written, the memo provided little guidance on the length or extent of the payment freeze.

With this information, our leadership and staff identified 61 impacted grants that PGST receives funding from. These include sources that support programs, services, and projects related to food assistance, child-care, housing, emergency preparedness, Head Start, energy assistance, foster care administration, health services, environmental protections, and more.

An hour before it was set to go into effect, a federal judge placed a hold on the funding freeze. The next morning the action was rescinded by the issuing federal agency. This is just one example of how this Administration keeps moving the targets, which wastes the time and resources of organizations like ours, while sowing confusion and panic among the people.

To be clear, the Office of the President and agencies serving under the Executive Branch do NOT have the power to stop funding approved by Congress, but this Administration seems intent on pushing the boundaries of what is allowed under the law.

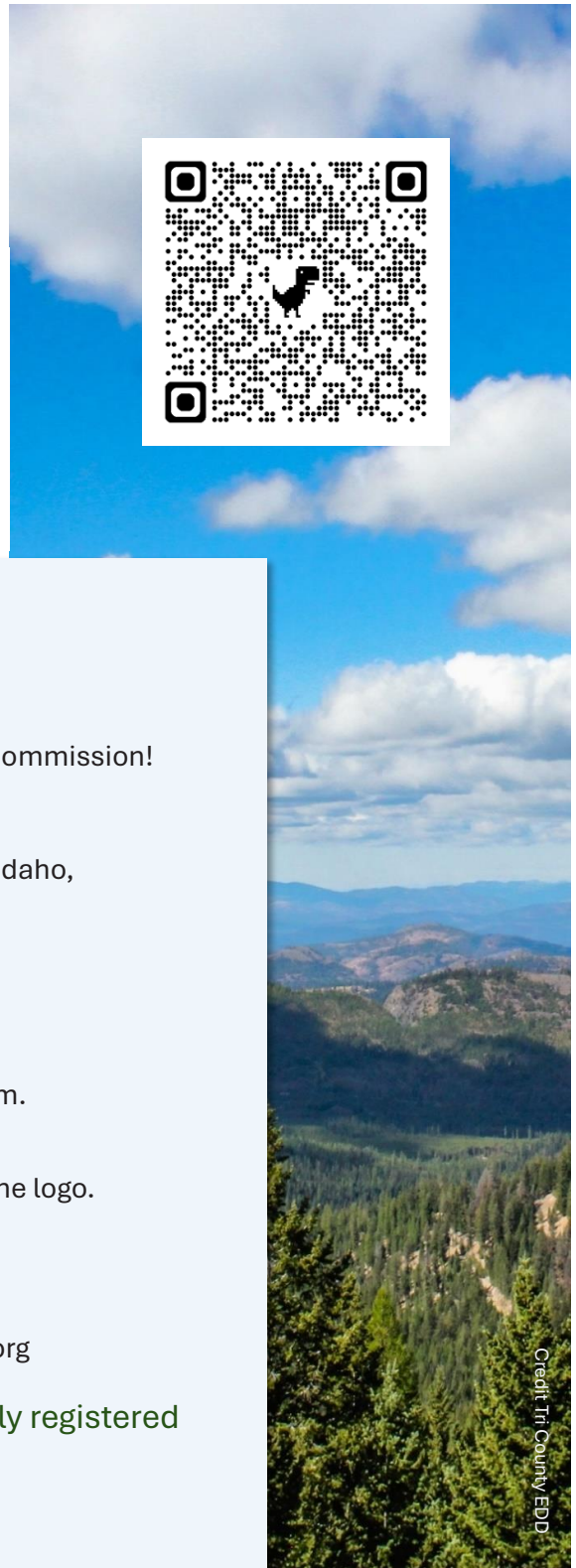

Guidance for PGST Community Related to U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement

The current Administration has ordered the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) to detain illegal immigrants. Some tribes in other states have reported their members are being questioned by ICE. We are not aware of ICE agents questioning tribal members in Washington State but want to offer suggestions anyway.

The Tribe suggests PGST community members carry with them state-issued ID or driver's license, passport, enhanced ID, or a copy of a birth certificate. Do not carry an original birth certificate. If you have it available, also carry your Tribal ID, but please make sure you have at least one other form of identification as listed above available.

Washington state law limits law enforcement cooperation with actions related to immigration enforcement and several local agencies—including the Poulsbo Police department and Kitsap County Sheriff's Office—have confirmed that they are not asking individuals about their immigration status.

And that's where we—as a government and the leaders of PGST—come in. Among the many ways we are responding to this Administration, we are:

- Working on plans and strategies to ensure we're able to continue to provide essential services even in the face of funding freezes or other disruptions.
- Empowering our legal and lobbying teams to monitor and act as necessary in the best interest of the Tribe to protect our members, sovereignty, and culture.
- Activating our strong relationships with state and federal legislators to make known our expectations.
- Communicating with other tribes to ensure timely and coordinated responses as appropriate.

Every day of this Administration so far has brought a new challenge. It would be imprudent to share every action and concern as it is likely to shift, change, or disappear as quickly as it comes about. Please do not interpret silence as inaction. We are watching and working every day.

I have studied Federal Indian Policy in depth during my ed-

ucation, and this is not the first time our people have faced challenges with shifts in the federal administration. Our people have survived the Removal Era, the Termination Era, and countless other challenges. We are resilient, connected by our community and culture, and uniquely prepared for any challenges that lie ahead.

I have full confidence in our dedicated staff, who are on top of the issues and truly care about what is best for our community. Together, with their expertise, we are poised for success no matter what challenges we are to face.

Let's remember that we are 'The Strong People' because our history proves it, and we will continue to live up to our name.

Call for Artists for Cultural and Natural Resources Projects

The Cultural and Natural Resources Departments invite artists to submit Statements of Interest for art pieces to be displayed at the Nəx̣wq̣ɣt Point Park, the conservation easement located across from Point Julia. These pieces will celebrate the Port Gamble S'Klallam people and their ancestral ties to Nəx̣wq̣ɣt Point, from time immemorial to today. We will be selecting Port Gamble S'Klallam artists for this opportunity. We anticipate that the project will provide opportunities for both established and emerging artists to be represented.

Project Overview

We are seeking multiple artists to engage in a collaborative design process with our architecture and landscape architecture team to celebrate Port Gamble S'Klallam artistry and heritage through artwork and artist-designed elements that will become permanent components of a new public park at Nəx̣wq̣ɣt Point. Works should strive to promote the spirit and heritage of the community. Selected artists will receive a fixed stipend to participate in two half-day workshops with the design team to develop specific proposals that inform and are informed by the overall park concept. We anticipate that there will be opportunities for both self-contained art pieces AND for creative design motifs that are integrated into constructed elements of the park.

Compensation for the execution of the work will be negotiated with each artist based on the scale and complexity of their proposed project; but will be comparable to typical fees associated with public art projects in the region.

Self-contained art pieces could include carvings, paintings, or other media where the artist executes the work on site or provides a finished work to be installed at the site. Examples might include welded or cast metal sculptures, carvings, wall panels, site-painted murals, or other displayable media. Artist-designed elements or motifs are fabricated by the construction team to incorporate your design and may be repeated over a broad area. Examples might include patterns stamped into concrete pathways, paver stone design, metal railings with laser-cut designs, graphic logo(s) integrated into the site signage package,

or other creative, site-specific ideas, including those using live plant materials or other natural elements.

Artists will be contacted by March 14th and invited to individual concept meetings in late March, 2025.

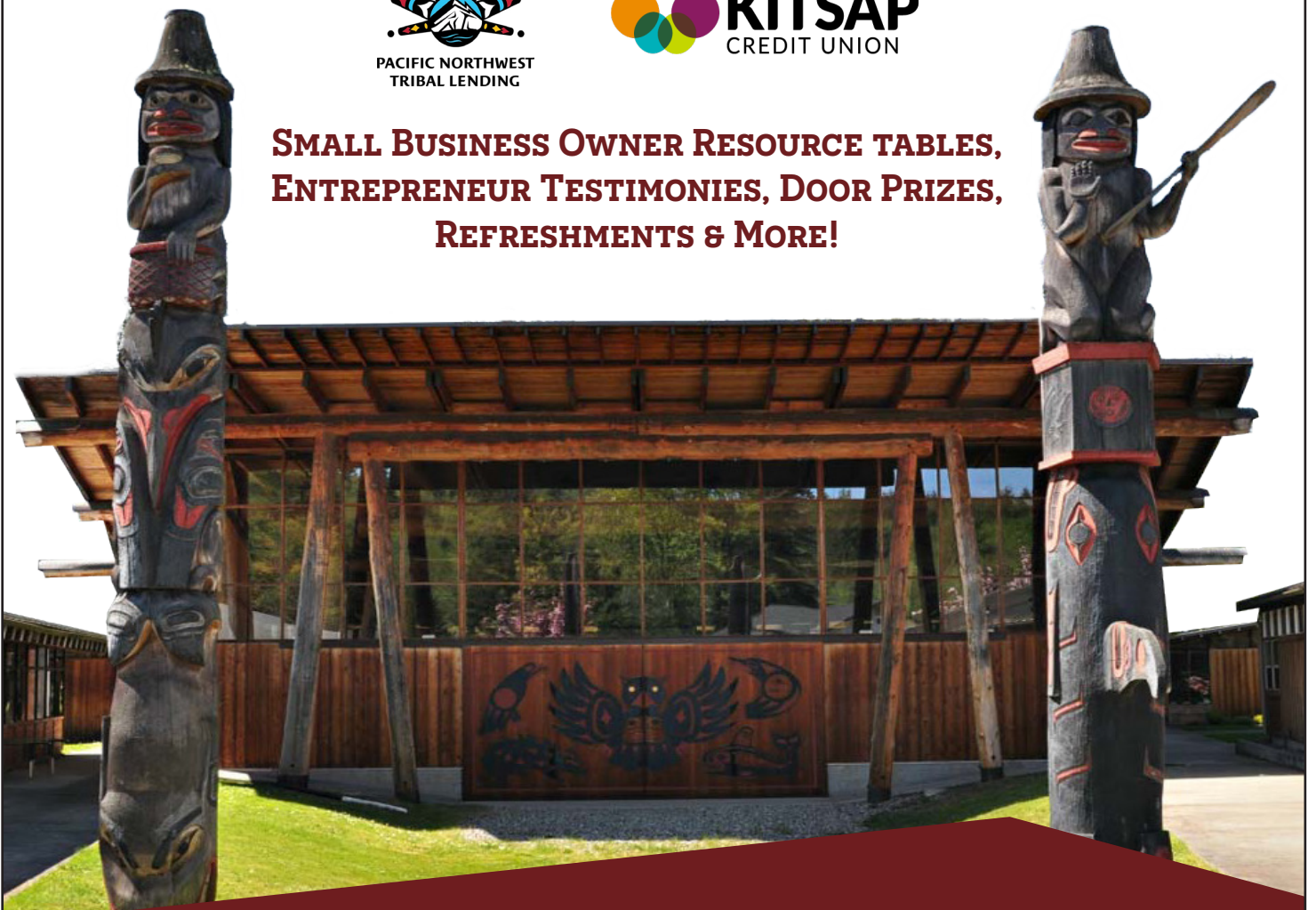

Fish War is a feature-length documentary that follows the tribes' fight to exercise their treaty-reserved rights. A landmark court case in 1974 would affirm the tribes' treaty rights and establish them as co-managers of the resource, but the fate of salmon in the Pacific Northwest still hangs in the balance.

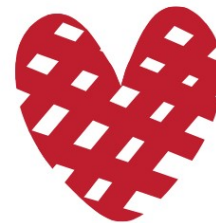
