



Agreement Between PGST Police and Kitsap County Sheriff's Office Goes Into Effect in April

Agreement provides PGST Police jurisdiction to arrest non-Indians for state crimes



The Interlocal Agreement (ILA) between the Port Gamble S'Klallam Tribe and the Kitsap County Sheriff's Office (KCSO) will go into effect in April. The ILA was announced and signed by Chairwoman Amber Caldera during a Kitsap County Commissioners meeting in late November.

The ILA will help the Tribe and the County cooperate in the interest of making the most efficient use of powers and resources on the basis of mutual advantage.

As a general rule and without this agreement, PGST police cannot arrest non-Indians on or near the reservation. The police only temporarily detain and wait for a Sheriff's deputy to take further action. When it was not possible for the Kitsap County Sheriff's Office (KCSO) to send a deputy, PGST police are normally forced to release suspects to avoid unlawful detention.

"The ILA and protocols enable PGST to better protect public safety, authorizing tribal police officers to enforce state law against non-Indians even when a Sheriff is unavailable," said David Robinson, PGST Attorney. "The effects of the ILA and protocols are most likely to be felt at the Casino, Gliding Eagle, and other community and governmental areas that are exposed when the Sheriff can't respond or is unable to respond fast enough."

The ILA closes a public safety gap that has existed between the jurisdictions of the PGST police and KCSO. It is intended to allow PGST police to protect the PGST community against smaller Washington state crimes and misdemeanors. More serious offenses, such as murder, will still be presided over by the FBI.

This agreement does not change how PGST Police interacts with the PGST community. In its ability to be able to arrest non-Indians for state crimes, PGST police will be able to strengthen safety on the Reservation.

The signing of the ILA opens a new chapter in partnership between PGST and Kitsap County. It came about through the hard work of internal staff, including PGST police and attorneys and KCSO representatives. Jeffrey Menge, Chief, Patrol Division, KCSO, was particularly helpful throughout the collaborative process.

"PGST and Kitsap County have shared law enforcement interests and history. The ILA and protocols reflect our shared concern in protecting public safety on and near the Rez," said Robinson.

While the ILA affords PGST police more authority over non-tribal individuals on and near the Reservation, KCSO and Kitsap County are not afforded any tribal authority in exchange.

Cultural Resources Department Update: Embracing Community and Craftsmanship



As the indoor season envelops us, the Cultural Resources Department has seized the opportunity to reset and reflect while engaging with our community through various crafts. This month, we successfully hosted two separate beading classes. Participants delved into the intricate world of beading embroidery in one session, while the other focused on the foundational techniques of Brick Stitch. Led by the talented and patient Ariana Griggs and Roxanne Hockett. These classes have provided our tribal members with a wonderful space to learn, share, and connect.

In addition to our beading sessions, we kicked off our first wool weaving session of the year. Instructors Kelly Sullivan and Roxanne Hockett introduced participants to Tumpline Weaving, marking the beginning of what will be a series of weaving classes. Our goal is to foster a new generation of teachers and create beautiful regalia as we prepare for this year's Canoe Journey to Lower Elwha.



We also held our first Canoe Family meeting and would like to remind all tribal members that the Canoe Family is open to everyone. You do not need previous canoe experience or to have participated in the past; however, it is essential to show up and actively participate in meetings and events. Additionally, the Culture Resources Department is refurbishing the carving shed. Once completed, this upgraded space will allow us to offer more carving and art classes, providing even more opportunities for our community to engage in these traditional practices. We will be doing a community workday and reaching out to families whose relatives served as caretakers of the building.

MAY 5TH IS MMIWR AWARENESS DAY

In 2022 the White house issued a proclamation that extended the day to cover all gender identities, changing Women and girls to persons (we choose Relatives). According to the Urban Indian Health Institute "Not only is the murder rate ten times higher than the national average for women living on reservations but murder is the third leading cause of death for Native Women"

Here at Port Gamble S'Klallam Tribe, we have been honoring missing or murdered women and relatives annually since 2019. The first year we had a walk then covid in 2020 a car parade, 2021 another car parade, 2022 a walk, 2023 another walk and a healing circle, 2024 another walk and healing circle. This year we are planning another walk and healing circle afterwards. The walk will be May 5th2025 rain or shine leaving the Gliding Eagle at noon. There is a limited number of t-shirts available to the first to arrive for the walk so please get there early to ensure you get yours.

In addition to the annual walk we are putting together an Ad Hoc Committee for a Missing, Murdered, Indigenous, Women, and Relatives (MMIWR) community response plan. In this plan we are creating our response as a community (police, advocacy, community and Media) to missing or murdered relatives.

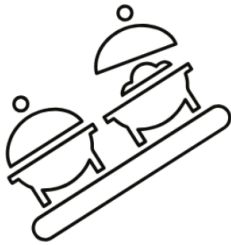
