As summer approaches, the Cultural Resources Department has been diligently working throughout the month to engage our community and honor our heritage. This month was particularly significant as we participated in the MMWR March, raising awareness for our missing relatives. Our presence at this event underscored our commitment to cultural advocacy and remembrance and healing.

In addition, we had the privilege of representing our people at a historic shared harvesting site on Whidbey Island, where we focused on restoring camas prairie. This important work not only revitalizes our land but also strengthens our connection to traditional practices. To celebrate the fruits of our labor, we brought back camas to share at our Spring First Foods Feast, where we delighted the community with the bountiful offerings of spring and early summer.

Furthering our cultural education, we facilitated a traditional weaving class, where tribal members learned to create traditional wool tunics. We would like to extend our heartfelt gratitude to tribal member Roxanne Hockett, whose expert teaching methods enriched the learning experiences for our tribal members. We are particularly thankful for her generous donation of eagle feathers, which will allow for the peyote stitch beading technique to be shared.

We are truly grateful for the support we receive from our community, which enables us to create access to our rich cultural heritage and ancestral teachings. The success of our events depends on the collaborative spirit of our membership, and our hands go up for those who show up and help us with our labors of love.

Utility Board Issues New Fee Schedule

On May 28, 2025, the Utility Board held a public hearing to review and consider updates to the utility user fee schedule. We appreciate the participation and feedback from community members during this important process.

In accordance with Title 19.07.04 of our Law & Order Code, this notice serves to inform you that the new rates will take effect beginning with the July 1, 2025 billing period.

Need PGST Police? Call 9-1-1

The Port Gamble S'Klallam Police Department wants to remind community

members to call 9-1-1 when they need police assistance, whether an emergency or not.

PGST has contracted with Kitsap County 9-1-1 CENCOM for over a decade to help route calls to available officers. The Tribe pays for this service, which the County can provide for a fraction of what it would cost for the Tribe's Police department to staff and manage their own dispatch center. Not utilizing the service wastes Tribal dollars and slows down response time.

Utilizing 9-1-1 also gives people access to police response even when the office is closed or officers are off-the-clock, and creates a call log, which helps to hold PGST Police or Natural Resources Enforcement accountable.

Get Free Civil Legal Services

Vivian Garcia has been hired full-time as the Tribe's Civil Legal Service Attorney. In this role, she is available to assist Tribal members with civil legal matters, including family law, estate planning, unemployment needs, creation of wills, power of attorney, housing insecurity, medical or consumer debts, fishing/natural resources citations, and more.

She is happy to talk over the phone or set up an appointment to meet in person. She also offers drop-in open office hours from 1-4 pm every Wednesday. Her office is in the Grants building.

Learning by Designing: Pacific Northwest Coast Native Indian Art, Volume 1 by Jim Gilbert & Karin Clark: Gilbert & Clark collaborated with Northwest Coast artists and Elders to create this comprehensive work, introducing the reader to the four major regions of NW Coast cultural design and exploring basic design elements such as the formline, U-shape, ovoid and S-shape. Containing over 800 illustrations in both traditional and contemporary art styles, this is one of the most thorough reference works available on Pacific Northwest Coast First Nations two-dimensional art. The Bone Picker: Native Stories, Alternate Histories by Devon A. Mihesuah (Choctaw Nation): In this colorful anthology, noted Choctaw scholar Devon A. Mihesuah offers

a dozen tales combining people from history and legend as well as supernatural beings from tribal lore. Fans of Mihesuah's nonfiction will find several of the historical figures and events she has previously covered here in a fictional format. (*Fiction* • Book • 2024)
