



## PGST Issues Guidance on How to Handle Interactions with Federal Agents

### WHAT TO DO AS A TRIBAL MEMBER APPROACHED BY A FEDERAL AGENT

- Keep your Tribal ID on you at all times. If it is expired, renew it ASAP.
- Obtain a Real ID and carry it with you. This enhanced ID provides proof of citizenship. PGST will reimburse the cost. You can find info on the process here: <https://dol.wa.gov/id-cards/real-id>
- Memorize or keep your emergency contact information on you outside your phone. Write them down on a piece of paper and keep this in your wallet.
- Remember: You DO NOT have to open the door to federal agents unless they have a valid warrant signed by a judge.
- Print this document and either keep the whole thing or, at least, the card to the right in your car or wallet. Consider making a copy of your Tribal ID to put on the back of the card and laminate it.



"I am a citizen of the Port Gamble S'Klallam Tribal Nation, which is a Tribal Nation federally recognized by the United States. This means I am also a U.S. citizen according to the U.S. Citizenship Act of 1924, 8 USC Section 1401.

All documents are available from the Community Resources section of the PGST website, which is found under the Government menu.

All PGST members are encouraged to obtain their Tribal ID and keep that, as well as a state-issued ID, on them at all times. PGST is also asking members to consider applying for an Enhanced Real ID. This is done through the state and PGST will reimburse Tribal members for the expense.

On Saturday, January 24, the Port Gamble S'Klallam Tribe held a Know Your Rights Information Session in the Longhouse for Tribal community members. The session was facilitated by Lindsey Schromen-Wawrin, a Port Angeles City Council member and attorney with experiences helping individuals protect their civil rights.

The event, which was attended by several dozen community members, was planned in response to increasing interactions across the country between U.S. citizens and federal agents.

To start, Schromen-Wawrin asked participants about their concerns, which ranged from how to verify U.S. citizenship and what tools can PGST provide to protect members to the emotional/mental toll of being stopped or detained and how to provide resources to those outside county or state.

After the event, PGST leadership working in concert with the Legal department—including the Tribe's Civil Legal Attorney, Vivian Garcia—worked to put together a series of documents to provide initial guidance related to handling interactions with

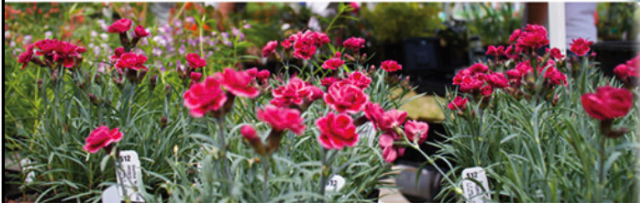

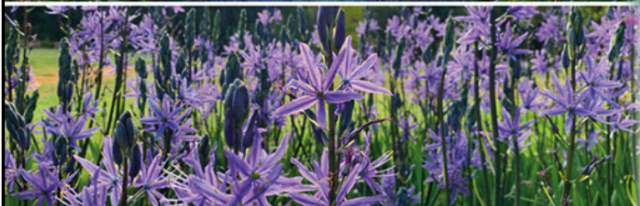

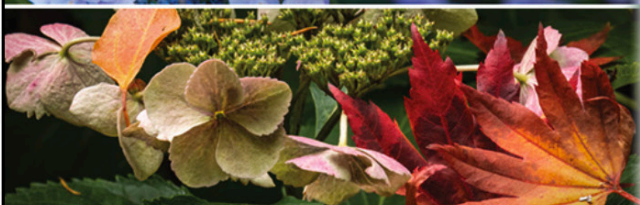

# Call For Artists: Energy Sovereignty Program Logo

## Introduction

The Port Gamble S’Klallam Tribe (Contracting Party) is seeking proposals for an Energy Sovereignty Program Logo. Designs should relate to the culture, history, and/or landscape of the Port Gamble S’Klallam Tribe. Inclusion of the sun, solar panels, batteries, lighting bolts, or other energy-related symbols is encouraged. The chosen artist will receive compensation of \$500.

## Timeline

- January 22, 2026: Call posted

- February 28, 2026: Artist submissions due
- March 27, 2026: Artist selection notification (this date may vary slightly due to review process scheduling)

## Submission Guidelines/Requirements

- Artists must PGST Enrolled.
- Artwork submitted must not currently appear (nor have been previously used).
- Four logo versions:
  - Color – with “Energy Sovereignty Program”
  - Color – no words
  - Grayscale – with “Energy Sovereignty Program”
  - Grayscale – no words
- There are no specific color requirements, but the usage of green is preferred.
- No more than three distinct colors should be used (not including black).

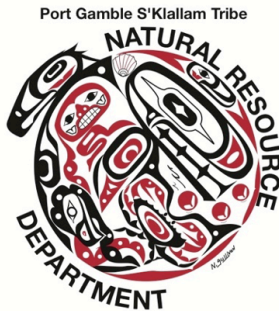

## Opportunities and announcements for the S'Klallam Community

### Spring General Council: Saturday, March 28

Mark your calendars: Spring General Council is scheduled for Saturday, March 28 at 9 am in the Longhouse.

General Council meetings are closed to anyone other than PGST members. A quorum is required to vote in new members, so please arrive early! More details coming soon!

### Elder Assistance for 2026 Now Available

The PGST Council supports granting assistance to eligible PGST enrolled Tribal elders aged 55 years and older to help with expenses associated with their principal residence. Elders may apply for \$3,000 per calendar year. Elders may choose to receive two \$1,500 payments or one \$3,000 lump sum.

Applications are available via the Members only section of the PGST website or from the Front Desk. They are being accepted now and through October 19,

2026 at 4:30 pm.

### PGST Retail Tax Effective as of Jan. 1, 2026

As of January 1, 2026, PGST has implemented a new retail sales tax, which will mirror Washington State's current rate. The tax will apply to common retail purchases, the same way food, beverages, hotel rooms, goods, and other services are taxed off-reservation.

This tax is for the benefit of the Tribe. Tribal members will NOT be required to pay or collect taxes for sales on-reservation.

Tribal members are exempt from paying retail tax. Tribal ID is required at time of purchase. Tax will be charged without valid Tribal ID. Tax cannot be refunded.

### PGST Dumpster Dates!

In 2026, on-reservation dumpsters will be made available once a month. Tribal

members will be allowed two drop-offs per opening and sign-in is required upon drop-off.

Upcoming dumpster dates are February 14 & 15, March 14 & 15, and April 11 & 12. The dumpsters are located at the Utilities complex. This new schedule takes the place of monthly dump vouchers and the spring/fall cleanup.

He captains a canoe crewed by an unlikely team including a human bear-cousin, a massive wolf, and the endlessly vulgar raven. Together, they face stormy seas, cannibal giants and a changing world. Elān is a storyteller, not a warrior, but he must choose his role in his own epic story. (Fiction • Book • 2025)

*Fighting for the Puyallup Tribe: A Memoir by Ramona Bennett Bill* (Puyallup): A relentless advocate for Native rights, Ramona Bennett Bill shares many of her experiences, including the Fish Wars of the 1960s and 1970s, and her 10 years as Chairwoman, organizing social welfare, education, and enrollment initiatives, and championing Native religious freedom. The book is full of vivid stories of her fearless

testimony in courtrooms, and of the many friends and comrades she made along the way. (Nonfiction • Book • 2025)
