



PGST Child & Family Services Program Honored by National Indian Child Welfare Association

The National Indian Child Welfare Association (NICWA) has named PGST's Child Welfare program its Organizational Champion for Native Children. Child Welfare is managed by the Child & Family Services (CFS) department.

On March 31, during the NICWA paddle raise banquet in Oklahoma City, PGST Chairwoman and former CFS employee Amber Caldera accepted the award on behalf of the program. During her remarks, Chairwoman Caldera talked about her own first-

hand impressions of the work the Child Welfare program has done to strengthen the PGST community.

"Prior to being elected as Chairwoman, I worked for our Tribal Child Support Program for 15 years," said Chairwoman Caldera. "The CSP is also located within the Children & Family Services department, so we worked very closely with the Child Welfare Program. This provided me with a front row seat to their tremendous efforts for many years."

She continued: "One of (the Child Welfare program's) earliest successes was the creation of the infrastructure that allowed Port Gamble S'Klallam to become the first tribe in the nation to operate a direct Title IV-E program. The impact of this has been lasting.

By being able to run our own foster care program, we have ensured that our kids stay in our community and don't lose touch with what it means to be S'Klallam."

In addition to Title IV-E, Child Welfare has been on the forefront of a number of programs and initiatives that further their commitment to PGST families, while providing hope, support, and a wrap-around approach with an emphasis on prevention services to avoid out-of-home placement. Their achievements include:

- The creation of the Strong Peoples Positive Indian Parenting Curriculum. Guided by the Positive Indian Parenting Curriculum from NICWA, this program is facilitated by a Tribal Elder and guided by the Child Welfare team to help parents become stronger, more engaged caregivers.

On February 5, 2026, PGST's Children & Family Services hosted the Fatherhood Outreach Event, a gathering that brought together fathers, families, and community members for an afternoon of connection, cultural sharing, and valuable resource support. CFS staff Leanne Tom and Shelaya Landers were the leads in planning and spearheading the event.

This celebration of fathers kicked off with the ELC Raccoon Class singing a special song, which brought smiles to the faces of all the attendees.

The event featured an inspiring lineup of guest speakers, including Tribal Council Vice-Chair Chris Tom, and Council Person IV Kyle Carpenter as well as Dennis Jones and Will Swift. They each shared personal stories about their journeys as fathers, including successes and challenges. Their resonate messages of reflection and humility helped create an atmosphere of encouragement and support.

Cultural teaching and practices took center stage during the event, including Elder Gene Jones Sr. sharing how to create a traditional fish stick from Ironwood.

Feedback Needed on Plans for Nook-Kayet Point at Port Gamble

The next chapter in the life of the former Mill Site is coming.

Since the Tribe purchased development rights to the property in 2021, Port Gamble S'Klallam Natural Resources has been working with an outside consultant on design concepts for the site, including recreation and restoration components.

In late March, a community meeting was held to share concepts and announce a survey to provide feedback

on next steps. Soon after the meeting a web page was launched—www.pgst.nsn.us/recreationplan—with info boards, videos, and a link to the survey. Three concepts are currently being considered, but the final concept will likely be a combination of several elements as supported by the desires of the community.

PRESENT DAY

Recreation Plan shown below in green. This complicated shape is the result of the constraints on all sides: (1) the steep slope to the west; (2) potential future development to the north; (3) completed restoration area with limited access to the south and (4) disruptive future shoreline restoration work to the east.

Work must minimize excavation to avoid disturbing either the contaminated soil cap layer, or the intact archeological resources. However, the existing ground is unsuitable for planting in its current state - significant amounts of soil will need to be imported to the site to provide a healthy base layer for new plants.

May 5th is MMIWR AWARENESS DAY

It is important to understand the connection between domestic violence, dating violence, and sexual violence and the high incidence of missing and murdered Indigenous women and relatives (MMIWR) in the United States.

The crisis of missing and murdered Indigenous women is not new. It is more than an epidemic- rather, it is part of the spectrum of violence experienced by Native women for centuries. (niwrc.org)

Here At Port Gamble S'Klallam Tribe, we have been honoring our missing and murdered women and relatives annually since 2019. The first year we had a walk then covid in 2020 a car parade, 2021 another car parade, 2022 a walk, 2023, 2024, and 2025 a walk with a healing circle afterwards.

This year, we are planning another walk with song and dance afterwards and a healing circle to be facilitated later in the month. The walk will be May 5th, 2026, rain or shine! We will be leaving the Gliding Eagle at noon and walking down to the Tribal Center. There will be limited number of t-shirts and stickers available to the first to arrive for the walk so please get there early to ensure you get one!

This year's MMIWR Walk could not have happened without our amazing volunteers! We cannot thank you all enough and appreciate you all!

In 2023, through the work of Child Welfare, PGST became just the fourth tribe in the U.S. and the first in Washington state to receive approval for their Family First Prevention Services Plan, which allows them to bill for prevention services.

- Developed and implemented the Child Welfare Practice Manual to help all program staff understand the traditions and values of PGST and outline best practices when working with families.
- Approval to license Kinship homes, which provide full-time care for children by relatives, close family friends, or other close connections.

“The Child Welfare team’s thoughtful approach has cut caseloads dramatically and strengthened families with coordinated, in-home services that align with Port Gamble S’Klallam cultural values,” said Chairwoman Caldera in her remarks at the NICWA event.

The NICWA award is the latest in a series of accolades the Child Welfare department has received for its work. Other honors have included Harvard Honoring of Nations (2014 and 2023) and the Casey Excellence for Children

The current Child Welfare team includes: Program Manager Joylina Gonzalez, Family Care Coordinators Dean Roan and Alexandra Erickson; Foster Care Coordinator, Cristina Pulda, and Kinship Program Manager Star Hagen. Supporting Child Welfare is the core Children & Family Services admin team, including Financial Manager Danielle Folz, department attorney Sonja Jacobson, and administrative assistant Miranda Smith.

“I would like to congratulate the Child Welfare team for this much-deserved recognition of their exceptional work. They continue to ensure the best possible outcomes for the children and families in our community,” said Cheryl Miller, CFS Executive Director, who attended the NICWA presentation event with the Chairwoman and Joylina Gonzalez.

Miller added: “I would also like to thank all of our CFS staff, who have worked in partnership and coordination with the Child Welfare department. Without your support and collaboration, this award would not have been possible. I am so grateful for everyone’s tireless service to the community and your dedication to children, families, and Elders. I have the best staff!”

Seasonal Giving Application Now Open

On August 26, 2024, Tribal Council approved a policy to provide food assistance to families engaging in cultural socialization and exchanges in each change of season. This program is discretionary and subject to changes in the Tribe's Annual Budget.

All enrolled Port Gamble S'Klallam Tribal members aged 18 and over are eligible to receive assistance of \$400 per quarter with an accepted application,

which is now live and available from the Front Desk of the Tribal Center or online in the Members Only section of the website at www.pgst.nsn.us.

This is an annual application, so if you complete and submit this application, you will NOT need to submit another Seasonal Family Gathering assistance application until April 2027.

Applications will be available and accepted through Thursday, April 30, 2026 at 4:30 pm. No exceptions to this deadline will be made. Applications must be completed, signed, and submitted by the deadline. Paper applications should be dropped in the black drop box in front of the Tribal Center. Do not hand to staff. These applications will not be processed.

Payments will be made by direct deposit for those who have this set up with Accounting or by check, which will be mailed on either April 17 or May 8.
