

Scenes from PGST's Canoe Journey Hosting

On Sunday, July 26, canoes began landing at Point Julia for the Paddle to Nisqually Medicine Creek Potlatch, which brought canoe families and tribes together from across the Salish Sea from July 31 through August 5, 2026.

One of the last stops before reaching Nisqually, PGST hosted around 100 canoes with a feast and protocol. For the first time, during the afternoon and into the evening, a Resource Fair was held in the Gym to spotlight programs available to the community.

4 Acre Parcel Donated to PGST: Thank you to Gene and Susan Anest

The couple recently donated an approximate four-acre section of forest between Cliffside Road and the Hansville Block. The parcel is a natural extension of the Tribe's holdings in the area. In addition, Gene and Susan also gave \$5,000 to support the Elders Program.

Gene Anest was instrumental in building the Longhouse, Elder's Center, and Education Center. Gene cut all the logs used to build the longhouse and helped prepare them for installation. His expertise in logging, drying, and carpentry was very helpful during the construction of the building. On top of this, Gene was hired to install much of the underground utilities for the Longhouse, making sure the water flowed and the lights went on!

In appreciation, Gina Steiner recently visited Gene and Susan and presented the pair with a cedar basket filled with culturally significant items. "We walked around the property and visited and picked berries. They were very grateful and are fond of the relationship with the Tribe," said Gina.

Japanese Knotweed Treatment Beginning Late August

Beginning in late August, PGST Natural Resources is kicking off a pilot program to handle a growing infestation of Japanese Knotweed, which is spreading in many parts of the Reservation and, if left alone, will grow out of control and harm native plants and waterways. While the treatment includes the use of herbicide, health concerns are limited and Natural Resources and its partners are doing everything possible to ensure the safety of the community.

Japanese Knotweed is a highly invasive plant that, with its jointed stalks and leaves that measure 4 to 6 inches, can be mistaken for bamboo. Growing up to 8-feet tall, plants can continue to spread indefinitely through a lateral root system called rhizomes.

Updates and Improvements to Voting System for 2026 Tribal Council Elections



PGST members who voted in the most recent Tribal Council election may have noticed some shifts in the process of how they cast their vote. These changes translate into more secure elections with more accurate results.

With the 2026 Tribal Council election, PGST Election Committee worked with MK Election Services, a private company that provides election administration services throughout the U.S. to Indian nations, labor unions, and public sector entities, among others. MK Election Services works with several tribes throughout Washington state.

While PGST voters still cast their choices via paper ballot, the tabulation of votes has been streamlined. Previously, PGST staff and Election Committee members called out the results of each ballot and ran a tally via paper and pen. Often, this process would have to be repeated, especially in close elections, taking a couple of hours to count and verify.



With this new system, after the polls close, under the oversight of the Election Committee, MK Election gets to work scanning the ballots in batches of up to 100. There are approximately 1100 PGST members who are eligible to vote. In the July 13th Tribal Council election, 292 PGST members voted.

After the ballots are scanned, the votes are counted and results are provided. The PGST Election Committee reviews the results and ballots, focusing on any that are inconclusive and couldn't be counted by the software. As in all previous elections, some voters had ineligible votes due to improperly filling out the ballot.

Finally, after all review is complete, the Election Committee certifies the results. This process and the oversight that's built in is expected to provide a more accurate count in a fraction of the time. This year the whole entire process from scanning, auditing and certification took only 45 minutes.

“We have heard a lot from the community about updating our (voting) system and our methods of counting ballots. Ron (Charles) has been an advocate of this for years. Our goal is to make sure the vote is accurate, while bringing confidence to voters about the process,” said Kelly Sullivan, Election Committee member.

She added, “Even though we’re working with (MK Elections), Tribal members are still overseeing everything.” Per PGST Code, all elections must be overseen and certified by the Election Committee.

In addition to shoring up the election process, the Election Committee has been working to promote elections. This has included videos featuring Elders about the importance of voting, and new artwork from Jimmy Price and Will Swift adorning election flyers, “I voted” stickers, and more.

“The members of the Election Committee were proud and excited for the improvements that MK elections made in our process,” said Kelly. “Not only did it improve accuracy, but it also improved the amount of time the committee spends counting. We continue to see invalid votes due to people not filling in the circle of the ballot and are working to improve our efforts to help voters complete ballots properly.”

The results of the election were announced on the evening on July 13. Chris Tom re-won his seat as Vice-Chair as did Renee Veregge as Council Person I. Matthew Ives was welcomed back to Tribal Council winning the seat vacated by Kyle Carpenter, who chose not to run for another term. Newly elected Tribal Council members were sworn in on Tuesday, July 14 to start their two-year term.

If left untreated, Japanese Knotweed can squeeze out native plants. It also thrives in streams, tributaries, and other small bodies of water. Over time, the plant brings a host of negative consequences, such as reduced stream flow, sediment erosion, reducing aquatic habitat, and increasing mortality for juvenile fish.

Japanese Knotweed cannot be controlled through manual methods like mowing and pulling, as such actions can make infestations worse. For example, shards or fragments of the plant created during mowing can grow into new plants, or even worse, spread by wind or flowing water to a separate area where a new colony of knotweed can establish.

Herbicides are always a last resort by PGST Natural Resources in dealing with invasive plant species. Unfortunately, in the case of Japanese Knotweed, targeted spray and injected herbicides are the only way to halt, and eventually eradicate, infestations. The coming effort will involve the use of herbicides on plants in areas with heavy growth, including behind the ballfield and along Little Boston Road. A tribal member's property, which is overrun with the plant, will also be treated.

"We don't want to use herbicides, and we wouldn't be if there was another reliable way to deal with the plants," said Megan Richard, PGST Restoration Project Manager.

Megan and her team at Natural Resources are working with Ecological Restoration & Stormwater Management (ERSM), a company licensed and trained to administer the treatment, while taking care to avoid contact with surrounding vegetation.

Treatment areas will be cordoned off with yellow caution tape for up to 48 hours. This is out of an abundance of caution as any sprayed herbicide poses little to no health risk within hours of application. While the contractor is skilled at targeting Japanese Knotweed, there is a chance that surrounding plants might also be impacted.

The community is asked to remain clear of treatment areas while they are blocked off. Please do not pick berries or harvest adjacent plants until the area has been cleared (**Natural Resources discourages berry picking or plant harvesting generally along roadways like Little Boston Road**).

Megan understands the community's concerns about herbicides and wishes there were other viable options for dealing with the current infestation. Given the need to control Japanese Knotweed to stave off its worst impacts, herbicides are the recommended path forward.

Summary:

Controlling Japanese Knotweed around the PGST Reservation is essential so it doesn't grow further out-of-control and disrupt the health of ecosystems that support native plants and fish. The best option is through the use of herbicides that pose very little risk. Crews applying the herbicide are taking every precaution to protect the health and safety of the community as well as neighboring plants. The treatment program will begin in late August or early September.
